Duration

Based on the scale, type of disaster, and the Agencies involved, it may be beneficial to have a more generaltion term. This •ection should take into account these factors.

Amendments

The Amendments ection allows parties to amend the Disas recific MOU as changes occur during the disaster recovery process. Further, this ion can be used to include additional Agencies who would like to participate in the MOU.

VII. Amendments

This MOU may be amended when such an amendment is agreed to in writing by all Parties. The amendment will be efective on the date a copy of the amended MOU has been signed by all of the Parties.

Termination

The purpose of the Termination ection is to allow parties to formally end their involvement in the Disaster-Secific MOU either singularly or as a group. This • ction acknowledges that parties may disgree and if amendments cannot be eached pr scribse a method for seiting the agreement. If the spirit of collaboration consider requiring notifications and/or consultation before the termination.

VIII. Termination

If any Party determines that the terms of the MOU will not or cannot be carried out, that Agency shall immediately consult with the other Parties to develop an amendment in accordance with Stipulation VI, above. If within thirty (30) days an amendment cannot be reached, any Party may terminate the MOpon written notification to the other Parties.


